



# DOES MY BUSINESS REQUIRE A **BUSINESS SITE LEASE?**

Because reservation land is held "in trust" by the Federal government, individuals and companies are not allowed to purchase land on the reservation. Therefore if you want to maintain a physical structure on Navajo land, you must either apply for a Business Site Lease or use an existing Industrial Site that is commercially zoned. If you run a business from your home, visit your local RBDO to see if a Business Site Lease is required.

#### WHAT STEPS DO I NEED TO TAKE?

#### STEP 1

#### Interview with local Regional Business Development Offices

Review and screen your business plan with your local RBDO. The plan must show feasibility of potential success of proposed business.

STEP 3

#### **Obtain Land Consent**

#### 3.1 Check with RBDO on Land Status

Hopi consent is also required for lands associated with the 1934 Statutory Freeze Area ("Bennett Freeze").

#### 3.2 Secure customary land user's consent

Request a consent form from your local RBDO and then consult the Grazing Permit Representative at your Chapter. This process often varies from RBDO to RBDO.

#### 3.3 Pass Chapter Resolution

- 1) Work with your RBDO to draft a Chapter resolution. You may also need to provide proof of land consent and approval for right of way. Your RBDO can help you with both;
- 2) During a scheduled Chapter meeting, you will put forward a resolution and request clearance from the Grazing Committee to start your business;
- 3) A hearing will be scheduled to present your resolution, during which the Chapter will vote to either approve or deny your proposed resolution.

#### 3.4 Fill out Business Site Lease Application

If you resolution passes, you have six months to complete and file a final business site lease application, including all clearances. If you wait more than six months, you will have to start over.

## 4.1 Environmental Assessment

Your RBDO conducts the environmental assessment and submits it to the Division of Economic Development (DED) for their review.

#### **4.2 Appraisal Report**

This step only applies to businesses with a certain revenue and is carried out by the DED Real Estate Department.

#### 4.3 Ethics Clearance

This step is only required by Federal employees, Tribal-elected officials, or Tribal employees.

#### **4.4 UST Compliance Report**

This step is typically only required for gas stations. An 'Underground Storage Tank' compliance report is conducted by the Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency.

#### 4.5 Land Survey

A Navajo Land Department conducts a land survey to identify the legal boundaries of the business. As the business owner, you can also hire a private surveyor.

#### **4.6 Procurement Clearance**

Navajo Credit Services conducts a credit check.

#### 4.7 Certificate of Good Standing

This step is required for Corporations or LLC/L3C businesses. Domestic businesses may request a Certificate of Good Standing from the Navajo Business Regulatory Department. Foreign businesses may request one from the Secretary of State in US state business is registered.

#### STEP 5

#### **Negotiating Lease Terms**

Work with your RBDO to negotiate the terms and conditions of the lease

#### STEP 6

#### Final Lease Approvals

On your behalf, your RBDO will submit Form 164 (Previously Signature Approval Sheet) to receive final lease approvals from Navajo agencies and the Office of the President.

The chain of approval includes: 1. DED, 2. Office of the Controller, 3. Department of Justice, 4. Business Site Lease - approving committee in the DED, 5. DED Real Estate Department, 6. Office of the President.

#### STEP 7

#### Ongoing Responsibilities

After the approval of the business site lease, the following must be submitted annually to stay compliant: 1) Rent, as stated in the lease; 2) Financial statement of gross receipts; 3) Form 200 - Declaration of Interest in Lease, submitted on the 15th of May to the Navajo Tax Commission.





# IS YOUR BUSINESS ELIGIBLE FOR NAVAJO PREFERENCE CERTIFICATION?

The Navajo Business Opportunity Act gives certified Navajo-owned businesses the first opportunity to bid on projects. Businesses get certified according to the following classification system: Priority 1 and Priority 2.
